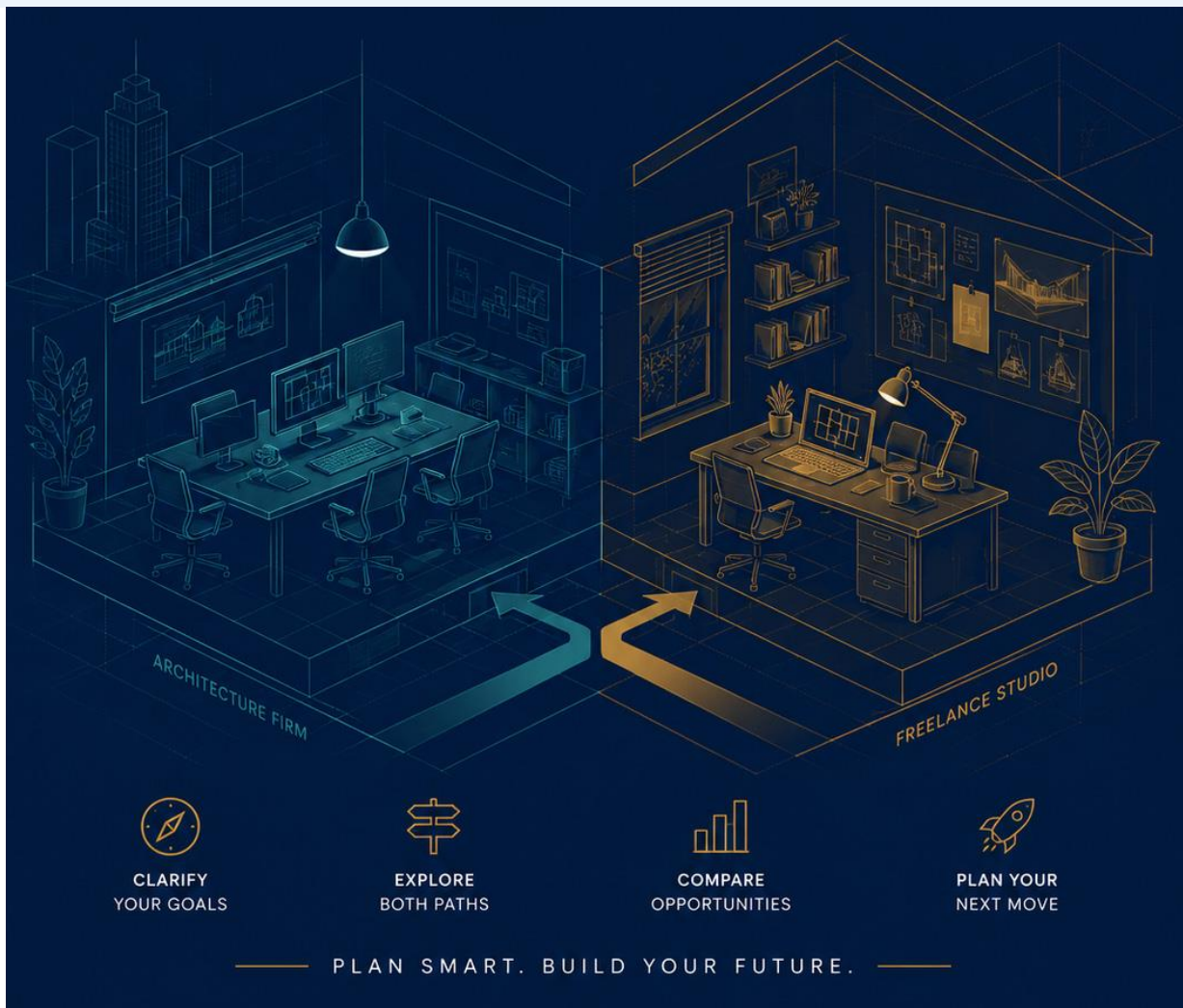

- ☐ **4. Set up a portfolio website or profile page** — *Archello, Archinect, or your own domain*
- ☐ **5. Draft a basic project proposal or fee quote template** — *Include scope, deliverables, timeline, and fees*

Freelance Financial Benchmarks for Architects

- India residential: INR 50–150 per sq. ft or 5–8% of construction cost
- Southeast Asia mid-scale: USD 3,000–15,000 per residential project
- UAE / Gulf: AED 15,000–50,000 per villa or apartment project
- Australia: AUD 5,000–25,000 for residential design and documentation
- Build a financial buffer of 3–6 months net expenses before going full-time freelance
